

ROCKY CLARK'S LISTENING POST

Although nothing in the radio entertainment field could be further unrelated, the Kefauver crime hearings and the Brooklyn Dodger baseball games have created a wave of anxiety among listeners in the Bridgeport area. They have been calling this column persistently to ask: What's the matter with WMGM?

WMGM was the only New York station to set up its microphone in the Kefauver hearing room to pick up the testimony of Frank Costello, Bill O'Dwyer and the other witnesses who created such sensation in the New York investigation. For people without

television sets, it was a most valuable service.

But many listeners, who hadn't been paying too much attention to WMGM since the Dodgers' games ended last fall, found that WMGM no longer came booming through the loudspeaker. In fact, its signal was so weak that it could scarcely be heard in some areas. And with the baseball season just around the corner, the fans became real worried.

So we called Jo Ranson, able publicity man for the station, and learned that ever since the hurricane-like storm of last November, which washed out WMGM's transmitter, it has been operating with an improvised 5,000-watt transmitter at East Rutherford, N. J.

"Give us another month, and we should be booming into Connecticut again," Jo explained. The steel has just arrived for the big new antenna tower WMGM must erect before it can turn on its big 50,000-watt transmitter. The station's engineers figure it will take about a month to put the tower up.

Meanwhile, Stamford's WTRC is broadcasting the daily testimony from the Kefauver hearings in Washington. The proceedings are also being "fed" over a Connecticut network including Waterbury's WATR.


