Truman Writes Letter Praising Marine Corps

WASHINGTON — (UP)— President Truman, who got in hot water last year for writing an unfriendly letter about the marines, wrote another letter Saturday praising the leathernecks' fighting record.

Mr. Truman penned his latest letter to the Marine Reserve Officers association which concluded its annual meeting here Saturday night. The president said it was "significant" that the organization "should meet in convention on the day set aside to salute the armed forces of the United States."

"Indeed," Mr. Truman continued, "the creditable record compiled by the membership of your splendid organization has earned for you a position of honor among our nation's 'defenders of freedom.'"

A Yale Man Make His Own Bed?--What Next!

NEW HAVEN — (U.P.) — Yale President A. Whitney Griswold announced Saturday that 70 maids will be laid off next fall in an economy move, leaving Yale men faced with the prospect of making their own beds.

Griswold said the dismissal affects maids who service student rooms and one shift of guards at gates of all the university's colleges.

Griswold said he did not expect lack of maid service to "materially reduce or impair the living conditions of the student body."
