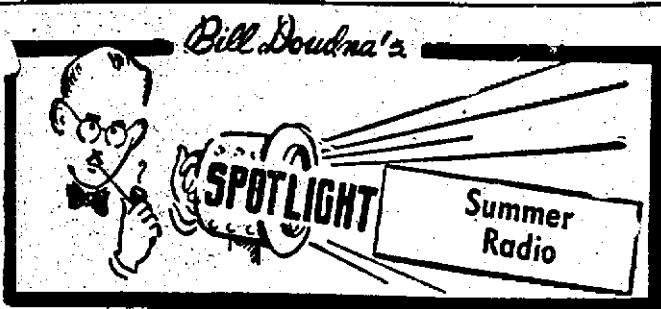

**CLINIC**—A music clinic for woodwind players will be sponsored by the music department of Eau Claire State college on June 21 as part of the 1951 summer school program.

Two clinical sessions have been planned, one at 1:30 p. m. and one at 2 p. m. in each of the following instruments: flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon, and the French horn.

Members of the Chicago Symphony Woodwind quintet will conduct the clinical sessions. The clinic will consist of informal periods during which students receive instruction and advice from the members of the quintet.

At 8 p. m., in the college auditorium, the quintet will give a recital as the first convocation of the summer school series.

**FILMS IN JAPAN:** The role of Hollywood films in building dem-

ocratic attitudes throughout Japan was considerably expanded in 1950, according to a Motion Picture Export association report from Tokyo.

For the past three years, the association, which represents America's major film distributors in Japan, has conducted an educational program, designed to drive home to the Japanese a fuller understanding of America and the American way of life. Using select American motion pictures as texts, a group of professional lecturers has been on continuous tour throughout Japan explaining and interpreting the cultural, social, and economic lessons to be derived from these films.

Because the "movie talks" have proved enormously popular with the Japanese public and have been hailed by American military government officials as an important adjunct to its reorientation efforts, steps were taken last year to broaden the activity.

The lecture team was increased from four to six and its programming stepped up to reach greater numbers of Japanese in all parts of the nation. In 1950, the six lecturers delivered a total of 4,236 talks—almost twice the number given in the previous year. The lectures were presented in schools, theaters, municipal halls, auditoriums, and commercial establishments throughout the country to an aggregate audience of more than 1,450,000 people.

Pictures like "The Yearling," "Naked City," "Best Years of Our Lives," "The Beginning or the End," "Chicken Every Sunday," "Green Grass of Wyoming," "Sitting Pretty," "Little Women," "State Fair," "The Boy With Green Hair," "The Jolson Story," and "Down to the Sea in Ships" are typical of last year's film releases that provided constructive topical material.
