# Chiang's Voice on Pact Blocked

## British Take Stand on Japanese Treaty

WASHINGTON —(UP)— The British government has informed the United States that it will not sign any Japanese peace treaty to which the Chinese Nationalist government of Chiang Kai-shek is a party.

This was disclosed Friday by authoritative sources who also revealed that Britain has abandoned her insistence upon treaty limitations upon Japanese shipbuilding capacity.

These sources said they expected the Chinese representation question to be the major issue to be discussed when John Foster Dulles, Pres. Truman's special representative on treaty matters, goes to London early in June.

The British view against allowing Chiang to sign the treaty has been communicated to Asst. Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Dulles by the British ambassador, Sir Oliver Franks.
