Poker Players Pay \$25 Fines; Others Dismissed

Five poker players who were arrested June 24 in a police raid at the Capital City club, 131 S. Murray st., were fined \$25 each in superior court Friday for being inmates of a gambling house.

Two other men and Randolph Moncrief, 56, of 724 Mound st., owner of the building in which the club is located, who was charged with being an operator of a gambling house, were dismissed on motion of Asst. City Atty. Alton S. Heassler because of lack of evidence.

Heassler said Moncrief was not in the club at the time of the raid and that he has a valid lease renting his building to the club. The club is legally chartered under state laws, Heassler said.

The other two men who were dismissed were Marshall Lee Carter, 26, Chicago, and Robert James Moore, 64, of 726 W. Washington ave. Although they were in the club at the time of the raid, Heassler said there was not sufficient evidence to prove they were in the poker game.

The men fined were Roosevelt Benjamin McKinley, 63, of 843 Williamson st.; David Howard Thornton, 51, of 1930 Baird st.; Roscoe Lee Blue, 35, of 726 W. Washington ave.; William China Hopkins, 67, of 761 W. Washington ave.; and Howard Cooper, 50, of 748 W. Washington ave.

Their attorney, Maurice B. Pasch, said they admitted playing poker for money, but thought their game was legal because it was in a "private" club.

Police raided the club on complaint of Corp. John Ramzy, a Camp McCoy soldier, who said he thought the game was "crooked" because he lost about \$40, his watch, and a cigaret lighter. Corp. Ramzy was previously fined \$25 in superior court for being involved in the game.

"This case illustrates that if you must play poker, don't play with strangers or invite strangers into your game," Superior Judge Roy H. Proctor remarked.

Navy Helicopter's 'Blowing' Saves 3 GIs from Drowning

PENSACOLA, Fla. — (AP) — A navy helicopter instructor used his windmill-type plane as a "blower" Friday to save three men from possible drowning in Escambia bay.

The pilot, R. C. Hamilton, 27, of San Diego, Calif., was on a practice flight when he noticed a small boat drifting away from three men thrashing about in bay waters.

Having no rescue equipment aboard, he swung the helicopter around on the opposite side of the boat.

Gusts of wind churned up by the blades blew the craft back to the trio.

The three, all navy reservists on active duty at Ellyson field, climbed in. Hamilton churned up some more wind to get the boat ashore.

The three rescued were Robert Alcove, Jack Rowland, and Ronald Adams, all of Ensley, Fla.

The navy report said the three had rowed far out into the bay and left their boat to go swimming. Before they noticed, the boat had drifted beyond their sight and lost its oars.

They frantically signalled the helicopter for help.
