## Toscanini Wins Poll for Eighth Straight Year

For the eighth consecutive year, Conductor Arturo Toscanini of the NBC Symphony orchestra won first place in his classification, "regular symphony conductor," in the Musical America poll of serious music in radio, the magazine announced Friday night.

(Among the 850 music critics and music editors participating was William L. Doudna of The State Journal.)
