Crime Probers End Hearings

2 Witnesses Sought as Unit Starts Report

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The senate crime investigating committee closed out its more than a year of colorful public hearings Friday after a futile last-minute search for two key witnesses. The two were Abner "Longie" Zwillman, former bootlegger wanted for quizzing on northern New Jersey crime and politics, and Charles E. Nelson, reputed number racket operator in the District of Columbia.

To Work on Report

Chairman Herbert O'Connor (D-Md.) of the committee said the open sessions had to end today so the lawmakers could work on their final report and legislative recommendations. The committee's life expires Sept. 1.
