Permits Indicate Decline in Building Here, MHA Says

Permits for 79 new residential units issued last month in the Madison metropolitan area emphasize the 1951 decline in building activity, the Madison Housing Authority (MHA) reported Friday afternoon.

In August, 1950, an all time record was set at 411 permits.

Completions, however, reached 189 in August this year, compared with only 29 in the same month of 1950, the high rate in 1951 stemming directly from the record number of starts in 1950, the report explained.

Of the 79 new August permits, 42 were credited to the city, 19 to the towns and 20 to villages. Of the total, 70 were for single-family residences. The 189 completions included occupancy permits for 80 single family rental type dwellings in Blackhawk park and 48 multi-family units completed by Football and Hillcrest corporations.

The August permits brought the 1951 total to 681, compared with 1,377 a year ago.

Rental type construction completed at the end of August brought the year's completions total to 259, "A much more encouraging figure than the 41 completed a year ago," the report said.

A net demand increase of 682 dwelling units for 1951 was shown in a comparison of factors including families entering and leaving the city, marriages, divorces, and deaths.

2 Medals to Be Given at Truax Review Today

Presentation of two medals will be made this morning at a dress review to be held on the apron in front of the 128th fighter-interceptor wing headquarters at Truax field.

The Distinguished Service Medal will be given to Col. John Price, new commandant of the wing, for his service in Japan and Korea. Presentation will be made by Maj. Gen. George R. Acheson, Kansas City, commanding general of the central area.

At the same time Gen. Acheson will present the Air Medal to Mr. and Mrs. Emil Buchholz, Tomah, as a posthumous award for Sgt. Robert W. Buchholz, their son, who was killed in 1944 while serving as a gunner over Europe.

The review will begin at 10:45 a.m. and will be open to the public.
