OPS Puts Industry in Chaos, Chief of State Canners Says

MILWAUKEE —(AP)— The president of the Wisconsin Canner's assn. said Monday the state canning industry is in a condition bordering on chaos as the result of ceiling price regulations.

"The existence and purpose of these regulations from the Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) are understandable," A. N. Meyer of Fredonia, told the opening session of the association convention here. "But their application is so complex and impractical that they have resulted in a tremendous amount of confusion."

"The regulations have perplexed some of the best minds in the nation. Many thousands of dollars were spent in our own state in hiring attorneys and auditors to assist us," said Meyer.

He said the delay caused by having to digest the "complex and impractical applications" of the price regulations cost the canning industry "hundreds of thousands of dollars."

"The item of peas has suffered the most, having lost from 15 to 20 per cent of its movement as contrasted with a comparable figure last year," Meyer stated.

The convention ends Tuesday night.
