## Life Magazine May Back Ike

NEW YORK — (UP) — Life magazine said in an editorial Thursday that it probably will support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for president, if he is the Republican candidate this year.

"If Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is the Republican candidate for president this year, the editors of Life will probably give him their enthusiastic support," the editorial began.

It said Eisenhower's qualities "should be made available to the American people. There is evidence that the people would support his nomination if given the chance."

The editorial said that Life's editors are "a little disturbed" that Eisenhower's official campaign "is not off to a very strong start." It added that his "would-be supporters" can at least review the reasons Eisenhower would make a good president.
