## Cafe Man Will Face Knifing Charge Monday

William B. Taylor, 41, operator of Taylor's Bar-B-Q restaurant, 834 W. Washington ave., will appear in superior court Monday to face charges of knifing his estranged wife with intent to murder her, Atty. Darrell MacIntyre said Friday.

Taylor was scheduled for trial Friday on disorderly conduct charges, for tossing a rock through his wife's window, but failed to show up. MacIntyre appeared for him and said he would produce Taylor Monday.
