## State Jaycee to Give 'Government Awards'

The Wisconsin Junior Chamber of Commerce will select a state and a federal government official to receive "Good Government Awards" for outstanding service in their respective governmental levels, it was announced Thursday by Richard F. Baer, state project chairman for the organization.

He said the names of the two persons to receive the awards will be announced "sometime in May."

Jaycees throughout the state are now in the process of preparing their nominations. Baer said, and the announcement will be made when the results of the statewide nominations are compiled.

Each award is to be made to an incumbent of an elective or appointive office, Baer explained and the awards will be made solely on the basis of excellence of performance of the duties of such offices.

No individual is eligible while he is a candidate for election or reelection to any public office.
