## British Adventuress Feared Drowned in Atlantic Ocean

DOUARDNEZ, France—(UP)—Maritime quarters feared Sunday that Ann Davidson, 38, British adventuress who set out from here June 10 in an attempt to become the first woman to sail the Atlantic alone, might have perished in stormy waters of Gasconne bay.

No word had come from the blue-eyed skipper since she put her 23-foot sloop Felicity Ann out of the tiny Douarnenez harbor. She was bound first for Cape Finisterre, Spain's most westward point.

The Felicity Ann, which carried no radio, was towed into port here when she developed engine trouble off the French coast May 24. While workmen repaired the trouble, Mrs. Davidson told newsmen she would make for Finisterre, the Azores, and then "some point along the Florida coast."
