# Arrival of Bess Cheers Truman

## He Hopes to Leave Hospital Saturday

WASHINGTON —(UP)— President Truman just about shook off the last traces of his virus infection Thursday and received a mental lift from Mrs. Truman's arrival at his hospital bedside.

Mrs. Truman hurried to the Walter Reed hospital as soon as her train arrived from Independence, Mo.

### Free of Fever

She found the President free of fever and anxious to get through with his physical checkup. Press Secretary Joseph Short said Mr. Truman "expects to be back in the White House Saturday."

However, he still was feeling some of the effects of the "mild virus infection" that hit him Sunday.

Mrs. Truman was in Missouri with her ill mother when her husband became ill.

She and Rose Conway, Mr. Truman's private secretary, were his only visitors. In between extensive examinations, the President kept up with his paperwork.

### Not 'Summoned'

The White House made clear that Mrs. Truman had not been "summoned" in any sense. A family friend said "she just wouldn't feel right unless she came here to see if there's anything he needs and if there is anything she can do to make him feel better."

With daughter Margaret in Europe, the President was certain to welcome the company.

Short emphasized that Mr. Truman entered the hospital "not on account of his recent illness, but on account of the checkup." His physician, Maj. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, wanted to make sure the chief executive was in shape before he enters the forthcoming political campaign.

The 68-year-old President is scheduled to attend the final sessions of the Democratic national convention in Chicago next week and has promised to campaign vigorously this fall for the presidential nominee.
