U.S. Tries to Settle French-German Fight

BONN, Germany—(UP)—Diplomatic sources reported Saturday that the United States had renewed efforts to mediate the bitter dispute between France and Germany over the Saar.

Informants said Secretary of State Dean Acheson had directed James Dunn, U. S. ambassador in Paris, and Walter J. Donnelly, new U. S. high commissioner for Germany, to see what they could do about the dispute.

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
