A beautiful voice, equally good in every register, was complemented by an exact knowledge of what she wanted to do with it and how to do it. In effective use of dynamics and in timbre, it reminded many of the voice of the Metropolitan's Bidu Sayao.

Another newcomer was Don Faust, a member of the chorus' bass section, who showed a warm baritone voice, a careful delivery of the Handet runs, and sympathy for melody. Fern Kirkpatrick was the superlative soloist in "The Trumpet Shall Sound."

Also new to Madison was Earl Bichel, Chicago tenor, who sang with drama and clarity.

Robert Tottingham, Madison basso, repeated his success of other years; particularly in the extraordinarily demanding "Why Do the Plations?" And Trudy Lane, contraito, returned from Rockford III., to renew her claim on Madison's affections with her charming, accurate singing.

The chorus, as always, met the score's demands with the reverence, the exultation, or the grief for which it called.

The orchestra's accompaniment was the best this reviewer has ever heard it give, but one missed the grean—for which a piano was substituted.
