DOG CURB PLANNED

BENNINGTON, Vt. (U.P.) — Wild dogs are killing many of Vermont's deer. "My department has found at least one dead deer a day," State Game Warden Jesse Watson, reported. A bill pending in the legislature would curb the running of dogs through woods except when accompanied by owners during February, March, and April.
