Preliminary Work Under Way for Wilhelm Tell Fete

NEW GLARUS—Initial preparations for the 16th annual presentation of Schiller's Wilhelm Tell pageant here Labor Day weekend were launched this week as casting directors began their job of checking the availability of last year's players.

The job falls to Dennis Streiff and Mr. and Mrs. Waldo Freitag of the English production, and Edward Willi and Paul Grossenbacher of the German version. The play, lasting about 3½ hours, is presented in German on the Sunday before Labor Day and in English on the holiday.

Albert Wirz will again direct the German production, but no director for the English play has been named. Last year for the first time in the history of the play, dating back to 1938, veteran members of the English cast handled the directing.

Community residents of both sexes, all ages and all occupations take part in the casts of the two plays which number about 150. A special problem with the German cast is the selection of youngsters who can speak German or the Swiss dialect to play the part of the Tell children.
