Water Gun Protects Community from Fire

LUBEC, Me. (AP) — "No," said the resident to the tourist, "that's not an anti-aircraft gun atop the canning factory. That's Bob Peacock's water gun."

Robert L. Peacock, 27, an executive in the R. J. Peacock Canning Co., owned by his family, was worried at the lack of fire protection in this coastal town.

As head of the volunteer fire department he decided to mount a powerful water gun in the heart of the downtown section. The gun can turn a stream of water on half the buildings on the main street.
