## Cardinal Spellman Visits 2 Hospitals

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York, on his third Christmas tour of Korea, Wednesday visited and chatted with some 480 Americans, Filipino, Korean, Belgian and Greek soldiers in two Army hospitals.

The cardinal plans to spend eight days in Korea. He will say Christmas Day mass for some 6,500 troops of the U.S. 3rd division.
