# TV Has Helped New Author

Back in the lusty year of 1929  
 senile readers may remember 1929)  
 ner's magazine about television.

I predicted it would be perfected  
 time, give or take a year or so  
 either way.

That prophecy was just about 10  
 years wide of the mark, but part  
 of the delay was due to the fact  
 that Gen. David Sarnoff and Col.  
 William S. Paley had to spend a  
 lot of time in Europe attending  
 to even more urgent matters.

I also predicted in this article  
 that when television developed on  
 a national scale it would do  
 serious injury to the movie indus-  
 try but would prove a boon to  
 the living theatre.

This was based on the guess  
 that people would become gluttons  
 with mechanical entertainment in  
 the home — "They'll be having  
 covered wagons in the dining  
 room," as Bugs Baer put it—  
 and, when they had the urge to go  
 out some place of an evening and  
 congregate, they would want to  
 see flesh and blood.

Well — television has hurt the  
 movies, although some recent pic-  
 tures (notably "From Here to  
 Eternity" and "The Robe") are  
 likely to do better than "Gone  
 With the Wind;" and television  
 has benefited the living theater,  
 but not in the way that I thought  
 it would.

Television has helped to provide  
 the theater with what it needs  
 most and for want of which it  
 seemed dying: new playwrights.

The past few years have pro-  
 duced a bonanza of young play-  
 wrights, as the merest glance at  
 the present season on Broadway  
 will prove. And when I describe  
 these playwrights as "young," I
