## Would Slash Interest on HOLC Loans

(State Journal Washington Bureau)

WASHINGTON—Borrowers from the Home Owners' Loan Corp. will find their obligations to that agency much less restricted if a bill to amend the HOLC act introduced by Rep. Ellenbogen of Pennsylvania becomes law.

Ellenbogen's measure would reduce the rate of interest from five and six per cent to three and one-half per cent and would extend the time of maturity to 25 years.

If accepted as introduced, the measure would apply to all obligations of home-owners to the HOLC, regardless of whether they were assumed before passage of the amendment.

Explaining the bill, Ellenbogen said: "Each home mortgage or other obligation or lien so acquired shall be carried as a first lien or refinanced as a home mortgage by the corporation, on the basis of the price paid for it by the HOLC."

Each would be amortized by monthly payments sufficient to retire the interest and principal within a period of not more than twenty-five years.

Ellenbogen pointed out that many borrowers cannot keep up their monthly payments at this high rate of interest, which his bill would reduce by about one-half.

## Wright's Tokyo Hotel to Have Large Addition

SPRING GREEN—(U.P.)—Frank Lloyd Wright, internationally famous architect, today shared in the triumph of art over business in a dispute over the position of a proposed 10-story addition to his "earthquake-proof" Imperial hotel of Tokyo, Japan.

Wright, creator of the hotel building which withstood the disastrous 1923 Tokyo earthquake, said today he had been informed by B. W. Fleisher, American editor of the Japan Advertiser, that the addition will be built at the rear of the structure and not across the front, as previously announced.

Fleisher told me that protests came from all over the world against erection of an addition across the front of the hotel, Wright asserted.

"And he also said the battle apparently had been won."
