Nationally popular sports are an ever-flowing source of material to Hollywood, what with pictures about baseball teams, boxing, prize-fighting, football, hockey, golf, and swimming. But although dozens of inter-nationally known college athletes appear in these pictures, Hollywood never uses their names for box-office purposes.

The reason is that college of all prep school and college athletic stars—amateurism.

The entire ice hockey squads of the University of Southern California and Loyola University of Los Angeles appear in Columbia's "The Game That Kills," yet the studio never so much as once mentions their names. Columbia, like other major Hollywood studios, is a source of considerable financial aid to young student-athletes working their way through school, and this means of income for the athletes is perfectly legitimate—just so long as the athletes appear incognito.

Hollywood's AAA

Farmers who drew government checks for not raising hogs and not planting wheat may now try the Hollywood scene. One, Lindel Peterson, is drawing \$25 a day for not operating his tractor. His farm is adjacent to the location lot where several scenes for "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer" are being photographed.
