New Jersey Will Vote Today on Legal Wagering

TRENTON, N. J., (U.P.)—A widespread drive to divert the metropolitan area's golden stream of horse racing profits from book makers to state treasuries receives its first test today when citizens of New Jersey vote on a pari-mutuel bill to be offered in similar form to the New York electorate in November.

Backed by Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City but generally opposed by churchmen throughout the state, the bill proposes a constitutional amendment legalizing racing in New Jersey for the first time since 1897 and providing apportionment of a commission to regulate an estimated annual betting turnover of \$50,000,000.

Spirited campaigns have been carried on by both camps for several months but observers believe the measure will be approved by an 8 to 5 margin with only a light vote being cast. The bill's strength centers in Hudson county, the Hague domain, and in seashore and northern sections across the river from New York. A heavy majority in these counties, which might profit from revenues of tracks and the vicinity, is expected to overcome light opposition in the south.

The measure merely states "It shall be lawful to hold, carry on and operate in this state race meetings whereat the... running of horses only may be conducted between the hours of sunrise and sunset on weekdays in duly legalized race tracks at which the pari-mutuel system of betting shall be permitted."

The price of admissions, the size of the track to be taken by the state and the sites on which tracks may be built are left to be decided by the commission.

Proponents of the measure claim its passage would provide the associations with enough money to compete with the Jersey plants; give New York an extra income of \$50,000,000 yearly from sources already tapped successfully by California, Massachusetts, Maryland, and other states; and remove the bookmakers from the tracks. Opponents claim it would put the state into the gambling business. The New York bill will fix prices of admission, and the percentage to be taken by the state and the tracks.

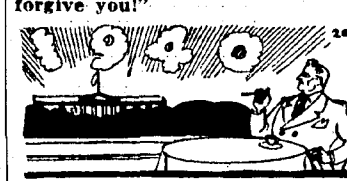

Under the new law all trucks rented by WPA with driver must be authorized under contract motor carrier permits. Trucks rented by the government without drivers are considered to be government vehicles exempt from provisions of the state motor transportation law.

The commission has sent letters to 2,000 truck operators advising them that if the owner or a hired driver is operating a truck on a WPA or any other relief project, the truck owner must be qualified as a contract motor carrier before July 1. This new law was recently passed by the legislature.
