Vassar And Columbia Savants To Sit In With Regular Master Minds Kieran, Adama And Quizzer Clifton Fadiman

A brace of college professors will be guest experts on "Information Please," famous NBC-Red Network question and answer program on Friday at 7:30 p. m. over WEA.

Sitting in with the regular masterminds, John Kieran and Franklin P. Adams, will be Dr. Henry Noble McCracken, president of Vassar college, and Professor Lyman Bryson, head of the adult education department at Columbia university. Clifton Fadiman will fire the questions at the quartet as usual.

Lucille Manners, soprano soloist, will be heard in Padilla's "La Violeta" and "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms." Ross Graham, baritone, has chosen for his solo a melody by Schubert entitled "Omnipotence."

FINDLAY MAN WILL DELIVER SUNDAY SERMON



DR. HARRY JEWELL SARKISS

Harry Jewell Sarkiss, Ph.D., head of history department of Findlay college, will speak at 10:45 a. m. Sunday worship service of Market Street Presbyterian church. Dr. Sarkiss will be the first vacation speaker during the absence of the pastor, Rev. Cornelius Nicholas Bakker.

His subject will be, "The Church in a Warring World." Dr. Sarkiss, who was born of well-to-do Armenian parents in the metropolis of the Near East came to the United States by himself at the age of 14 years.

In the intervening 25 years since that first bewildering day at Gloucester City, N. J., Dr. Sarkiss has amassed five college and university degrees, has served as a Presbyterian minister for 13 years and for a time acted as a buying agent for firms importing Oriental rugs.

He was also associated with the Near East Relief Committee and raised thousands of dollars for Armenian and Near East relief by virtue of his lectures in Chicago and other large cities in the Midwest.

He is described as an outstanding speaker.

WATER BARREL AS TRAP CUTS RAT POPULATION

ANTEL, Kas., Aug. 1—(UP)—A steel water barrel has turned out to be a good rat trap on the farm of Earl and Paul Landreth near here.

The mechanism of the trap is very simple, the Landreths say. The rats run up a board which leans against the barrel. On gaining the top, they reach out to get a drink of water. Then comes the blow. The water is just out of reach. The rats lean over too far, lose their balance and fall in.

They drown like rats. In fact the Landreths get rid of about 50 that way in one week.

If we insist in destroying a system which is copied on British history, it will succeed in giving the Godless war mongers in our midst free rein because when we finish destroying all systems opposed to the gold crowd, we will have poverty and bankruptcy and civil war, which are all buddies of communism.

In conclusion I want to say I am first, last, and always an American, and I am for keeping our boys and our supplies over here. Let us make ourselves so strong that we can command the obedience of foreign empires. As I said once before British cruelty caused Hitlerism. If this civilization is to continue, we must have a Lincoln in every land. Let's clean out the lying politicians, and have statesmen for a change, men who worship God and not gold.

EAST LANSING, Mich., Aug. 1—(UP)—Effect of the national defense program on farm labor is hitting home at Michigan State college, according to Dean E. L. Anthony of the agriculture division.

Dean Anthony says he has received "hundreds of letters" from farmers asking if he can help them obtain summer workers. In the past, he says, the situation was reversed and he was unable to find farms on which students could obtain summer employment. "Our students have the same attitude as the young farmers," Anthony points out. "They're not going to pass up good salaries in the city for a \$40-a-month, room-and-board job."

PRIORITY ASKED ON STEEL DRUMS FOR SOVIET GAS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1—(UP)—Defense Oil Coordinator Harold L. Jekes has recommended that the Office of Production Management grant priority on the manufacture of 10,000 steel drums in which aviation gasoline and other oil may be shipped to Russia. It was announced today.

K. Davies, announcing the action, said the recommendation followed conferences with representatives of Amtorg Trading Corp. Davies said that Amtorg has received export licenses from the state department covering "considerable volumes of these products." Davies said that arrangements are being made for tanker service from the Pacific coast to Russian ports "as it may be required."

About 50 articles are made as by-products of soybeans in the United States.
