Red Feather to Mark C. U. Campaign Donors

A traditional symbol of honor, whose history stretches back through the centuries, has been chosen this year as the insignia for the Community Union campaign which starts today.

When one of the 500 volunteer workers pins a tiny red feather on the lapel of a Madison citizen who makes his pledge to the Community Union during the two-week drive, he'll be performing a ceremony dating back at least 500 years. In the days of Robin Hood, it was the outlaw's custom to bestow a red feather on the member of his band who performed some unusually good deed.

Another story about the origin of the custom has it that Edward, the famous Black Prince of England, awarded the red feather to the knights in his train who showed special valor.

The Winnebago Indians, who formerly occupied the site which is now Madison, always regarded the red feather as a badge of courage and manhood.

The use of the feather symbol will be widespread during the Community Union campaign.

Joseph Rothchild, general chairman, has asked that persons making pledges during the early part of the campaign, wear the feathers, to avoid duplicate solicitation.

Two Art Seniors Plan Exhibit at Union Saturday

An exhibition of paintings by Sylvia Fein and John Wilde, seniors in applied arts at the University of Wisconsin, will open in the main gallery of the Memorial Union Saturday. This is the first exhibition of undergraduate student paintings since the Charles LeClair show in 1935.

Since many of the paintings by these students have been done outside of class during the past summer, the Union gallery committee has thought it worthwhile to recognize their additional work. Some of the paintings have been shown in state and national exhibitions.

It is hoped that this will be the first of periodic exhibitions of work done by senior art students extra-curricularly as well as in class. Both Wilde and Miss Fein have received most of their training at the University of Wisconsin.

Three Similar Hurts Partly Blind Boy

LABELLE, Fla., (U.P.)—Three accidents similar in nature and occurring in as many years are responsible for seven-year-old Earl Maddox having to go through life partly blind.

The youth, who loves to cut wood, has been struck in the eyes three times by sticks which bounced back as he swung the axe.

The first accident three years ago destroyed the sight in one eye. The second injured the other, and now the third has further impaired the vision of the seeing eye.

Site of Ft. Osage Found After Century

KANSAS CITY, Mo., (U.P.)—Old Ft. Osage, where the Santa Fe Trail began its path to the west, has been found after having been "missing" for a century.

Historians knew its location outside Sibley, Mo., a few miles northeast of here, but they believed that all traces of the stockade and few buildings had disappeared shortly after its abandonment in 1836.

However, highway workmen digging in the area have happened upon what are considered certainly the stone foundations of the fort's old buildings. The foundations were six feet under the cultivated sod on a hill overlooking the Missouri valley.

The discovery came only a few months after Jackson county had appropriated \$10,000 to purchase 16 acres for a Ft. Osage historical park. Now the county plans reconstruction of the stockade and buildings on their exact site over the old foundations.

Ft. Osage was built by Major George Sibley, sent out from Washington in 1804 after the Lewis and Clark expedition recommended the bluff site as a far western outpost.

ROME (U.P.)—An official communiqué reported Saturday that British planes attacked Cantanaro, on the toe of the Italian boot, bombed the railroad station, killed two, and wounded 14 persons.
