A new Henry Aldrich hit upon the screen at the Sigma theatre last night when Jimmy Lydon made his debut in the title role of Paramount's justly popular "Mr. Dynamite" series, "Burst" is the word for it. This new Henry, Jackie Cooper's successor in the part, has more spring and bounce to him than a bucking broncho—and just about as much kick.

The film was "Henry Aldrich for President," the third of the Aldrich series which brings the famous radio family to movie theatres. Most of us were captivated by the first two, "What a Life" and "Life With Henry."

This one, in which the irrepressible Henry runs for president of the student body at Centerville high school with hilarious results, surpasses its predecessors. This is no reflection on Jackie Cooper, who was a top-notch Henry, but it does mean that Paramount has struck its stride in making this type of film and has turned out a swifly-paced comedy that hasn't a moment's lag.

In their first picture in over a year, top comedians Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy are starred in "Great Guns," the new Quilna comedy slated to open Friday evening at the Quilna theatre.

In the past, the Laurel and Hardy comedies have never had a story—instead they worked from day to day, and when the filming commenced, no one could tell how the story would end up. Under their new contract, signed with 20th Century-Fox just prior to the filming of "Great Guns," they have a clause which permits them to O. K. the script before they work on the picture.

According to preview critics, this system has worked out much better for all concerned. There was plenty of room for the comedies to improvise—and they did, insert several spontaneous gags which hit them on the spot—and brought belly laughs at the preview. But the important point is that "Great Guns," unlike most of the Laurel and Hardy comedies that have gone before, has a definite beginning, middle and end.

Masters of slapstick, the slow burn and the delayed take, they take over the army in such a way as to make the Navy glad they weren't chosen. Tough sergeant Edmund MacDonald makes things miserable for them, and they fall for lovely Sheila Ryan, handsome Dick Nelson already has that situation well in hand. But the pay off is the unusual climax—unusual even for Laurel and Hardy—and the funniest in many a moon.

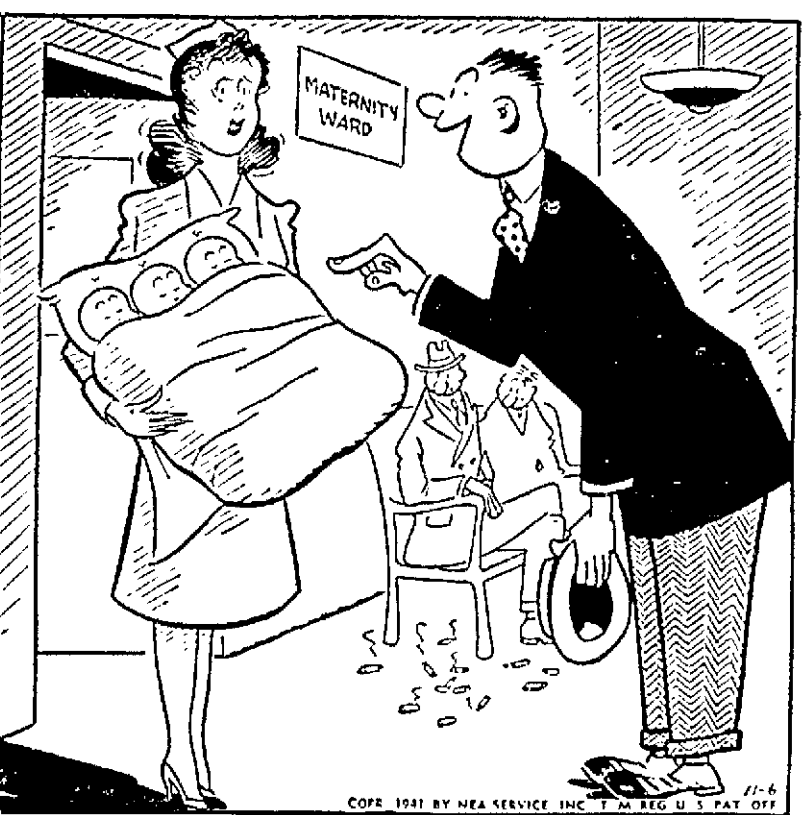

RAIL CONDUCTOR ENDS 56 YEARS ON PENNSY ROAD

NEW YORK, Nov. 6 — (INS) — Conductor Thomas Gullen, 70, has made his last run on the Twentieth Century Limited.

After 56 years with the New York Central Railroad, Gullen the other day pulled the whistle for the last time to send the New York to Chicago flyer on its way. It was his final trip on his regular run between New York and Buffalo—a round trip he made twice a week for the past five years.

Gullen, whose home is in Rochester, plans to travel while retired. Yes, he is planning an automobile trip thru the west, with sight-seeing in the Rockies before heading north for a tour of Canada.

Traveling also is his hobby. During spare time Gullen is a devotee of horseback riding.

He started his long railroad career with the New York Central as a messenger boy in Rochester in 1885. The son of a freight conductor, Gullen took over a similar job in 1900 after serving as a switch tender, car chalker and freight brakeman.

LIGNITE FOR GAS MASKS OBTAINED AT UNIVERSITY

GRAND FORKS, N. D., Nov. 6 — (UP) — Research directed at widening the use of North Dakota's large lignite coal deposits is being conducted at the University of North Dakota by H. G. Yuster, instructor in chemical engineering.

A carbonizing unit is under construction at the university, which will remove lignite constituents such as coal tar, ammonia and water, and the char obtained in the process will be used to produce activated lignite.

Situations board authorities list activated lignite as "strategic and critical" material because of its use in gas masks.
