SAN ANTONIO BIDDING FOR BIG CONVENTION

San Antonio hardware dealers have been asked to aid the community in obtaining one of 1951's biggest state conventions.

John Fielder, chamber of commerce convention manager, asked the merchants to wire officials of the Texas Hardware and Implement Dealers Assn., now assembled in Houston, asking them to hold next year's gathering in San Antonio.

Tom L. Powell, chairman of the San Antonio chamber's convention committee, was in Houston battling stiff opposition from Galveston. The convention annually draws some 1,500 hardware dealers from all parts of the state.

Fielder asked the dealers to address their telegrams to Ray M. Souder, executive secretary of the association, at the Shamrock Hotel, Houston.

Regulars to Serve In National Guard

Regular Air Force officers can look forward to duty with either the National Guard or one of the reserve components.

Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson has decreed that all regulars of the Armed Forces must serve a two-year tour of duty with one of these components during their military careers.

The move was taken on the recommendation of the Civilian Components Policy Board because in time of national emergency, officers and men of the reserve units would make up the larger part of the nation's fighting forces.

It is also believed the plan will work for the good of the civilian units, since they need the skilled aid and guidance that only the professional military career man can give.
