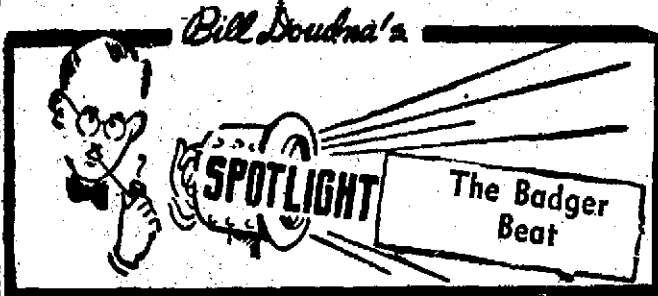

NEW LINK: Thirty-four "Towers of Babel," each singing hundreds of telephone messages and several television program over the earth, will link New York with Chicago Sept. 1, the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. has announced.

By Sept. 30, the communication network will extend to Omaha. Eventually it will go to the West coast.

The Towers are relay points in the new superhighways of communications that will augment existing coaxial cable routes to the Midwest. Radio beams carrying video signals and telephone messages will hop across them from New York to Chicago quicker than a wink.

The system will work this way: The "Towers" are built at intervals of about 25 miles across the 638-mile route from New York to Chicago on a line of sight level. This means that the Towers themselves are anywhere from 60 to 200 feet in height so the radio waves can move in a level line from one to another.

At New York, the radio signals, carrying video and telephone conversations in a beam similar to a searchlight beam, are flashed from the top of a New York office building to the first relay station in

The New York-to-Chicago network cost \$12,000,000 to build and provides additional service to such intermediate points as Pittsburgh, Johnstown, Pa., Cleveland, and Toledo, O.

The radio beam is sent across the country with a transmitter power of only 1/2 watt, about the same power needed to operate a small flashlight. A highly efficient metal lens is used to obtain the signal and if it were not used it would take a transmitter of 25,000,000 watts to produce the signal.
