# Detroit Industrialist Admits 'Pay Off' in Arsenal Deal

DETROIT — (UP) — Industrialist Joseph Wiesner told Wednesday that he paid \$1,800 to an ex-convict who was supposed to use the money to "pay off" an official at the army's huge Detroit tank arsenal.

Wiesner said he gave the money to "five percenters" Wayne Campbell with the understanding that it would be paid to "someone" at the arsenal for help in obtaining defense contracts.

Wiesner, owner of the Fairfield Engineering Co., said he got "several" contracts after giving Campbell the payoff money.

A congressional subcommittee met in Detroit last month to investigate irregularities at the arsenal, and Brig. Gen. David Crawford was relieved of his command as head of the big tank-producing center.

At the congressional hearing, Wiesner testified that he had never made any bribes to get defense contracts. However, when the Wayne county assistant prosecutor Ralph Carben threatened to file conspiracy charges against him, Wiesner admitted giving the money to Campbell.

Campbell has been charged with defrauding P. L. Grissom and Son, Inc., out of \$56,185 for automotive parts he failed to deliver. The firm had intended to sell the parts to the arsenal.

Wayne county authorities earlier swore out warrants against three Detroit handbook operators, charging them with conspiracy to violate state gambling laws.

Campbell said all the money he got from Grissom was squandered on horse race bets and endorsements on his checks have been traced to the three bookies, Frank McDonald, Henry Herriek, and George Thomas.

# Chicago Driver Fined for Striking Officer

Striking a traffic officer and locking himself in a squad car Tuesday cost a 30-year-old Chicago man a \$25 fine or 30 days in the county jail Wednesday.

Roy Delbert Pine, charged with disorderly conduct, was given the sentence by Superior Judge Roy H. Proctor.

Dane County Traffic Officer Robert Waldron said he attempted to take Pine to jail following a traffic accident Tuesday. Pine had run into a ditch in the 3500 block of E. Washington ave.

Waldron said he was getting out of the squad car at the jail when Pine struck him. Then as Waldron got out of the car Pine locked the two car doors and refused to leave.

Waldron got one of the doors open by reaching in a partially opened car window and forced Pine out of the jail.

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# JACOBY ON BRIDGE

bles continues today with a very delicate point.

When both sides bid energetically it is often necessary to double the opponents in order to shut your partner up.

Sometimes such doubles go sour, but in the long run they pay high dividends.

In today's hand North's original double is, of course, a takeout double.

Mind you, it's a very poor takeout double because North has practically no support for any suit that his partner can name. Nevertheless, many fine players would make this miserable double in the hope of competing with the opponents.

I would probably do so myself in spite of the fact that I cheerfully admit that the double is miserable.

Once North shows this sign of life, South can well afford to give the enemy a run for their money. At three spades, South is out on a limb, but the enemy fail to realize it. Hence they push on to four diamonds.

Right then and there North must double. He cannot be sure of beating four diamonds, but he should have a fair play for it, and he knows that his hand is valuable only for defense.

If North doubles, good defense defeats the contract.

South opens the Singleton club and North overtakes and continues clubs. North wins three clubs and then the fourth club assures the defenders a trump trick.

When this hand was actually played, North was too timid to double four diamonds.

His partner never dreamed that the North hand was worthless in both hearts and spades.

He went on to four spades and went for an 800-point ride.

West led the king of hearts and then shifted to a low diamond. East took the queen of diamonds and returned a heart, whereupon West took two more heart tricks.

Another diamond and eventually the ace of trumps gave the defenders six tricks.

The double of four diamonds produces a plus of 200 rather than a minus of 800. The total gain is 1,000 points.

You can afford to give the opponents a few points occasionally by doubling a contract that they can make if you sometimes gain such large amounts.
