## OPS 'Cabbage Act' Denied by Official

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23. (AP) The Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) is a little tired of hearing about cabbage. The cabbage routine evidently started last August in Memphis. Price Boss Mike DiSalle was the main speaker at a banquet, and was introduced in a long speech. During this long introduction the toastmaster got a laugh by saying: "Lincoln's Gettysburg Address contains 266 words. The Ten Commandments contain 297 words. The OPS order to reduce the price of cabbage contains 26,911 words." DiSalle got a laugh, too, by opening his speech with: "It took the toastmaster about 26,000 words to introduce me." ## U. S. Steel-Venezuela Deal to Boost Ore

NEW YORK, Nov. 23. (AP) An agreement between United States Steel Corp. and the Venezuelan government provides for river dredging which eventually will mean more iron ore for U. S. defense effort. The pact, announced yesterday, allows the company to dredge ship channels in the Macareo and Orinoco rivers to enable ocean-going vessels to bring out the ore from U. S. Steel's Venezuelan concession. The first shipment of iron ore via the ship channels will not be possible until early in 1954.

## Rusk, Hickey Meet on Japanese Bases

TOYKO, Nov. 23. (AP) Assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk today held two conferences with Lt. Gen. Doyle Hickey, chief of staff of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, on the U. S. bases in Japan. Hickey, in the absence of the supreme Allied commander who is in Korea, briefed Rusk on U. S. bases in Japan. Rusk is working out details of the Japan-U. S. security pact. Under the pact, the United States will maintain ground, sea and air forces in Japan after the occupation ends.

For Columbia records, Paul conducts the orchestral accompaniments for Jo Stafford, Doris Day, Tom Arden, Frankie Laine, Champ Butler and Sarah Vaughn. ## Man Shoots Self, Bullet Hits Father

GLENDALE, Nov. 23. (AP) A despondent musician shot himself in the back last night and the bullet, after passing through his body, struck down his father, too, police reported.

Both father and son were hospitalized in critical condition. Officers said Richard W. Elrebeck Jr., 44, a cello player, snatched a .38-caliber pistol from the holster of his brother, Joseph, a night watchman, as the latter prepared to leave for work. Richard held the gun behind his back and, facing his father, pulled the trigger. The bullet struck the father in the stomach. Officers said Richard Jr. had been in ill health and described the shooting as a suicide attempt. They said he apparently had no intention to shoot his father, too.
