

Red Sox Catcher Berg Will Be Heard On Quiz Program

Scholarly Moe To Be Right At Home With Talented Trio As He Is Lawyer And Linguist Of Note

Big-league baseball will supply the guest for the Information Please program Tuesday at 8:30 p. m., over WJZ in the person of the scholarly Moe Berg, catcher for the Boston Red Sox. He will feel quite at home with John Kieran, erudite sports columnist of the New York Times, Franklin P. Adams of Conning Tower fame, and Oscar Levant, composer, pianist and frequent guest expert, will complete the learned board that faces Clifton Fadiman.

Morris Berg, a native of New York, was graduated from Princeton in 1923. He has played with the Brooklyn Dodgers, Chicago White Sox, Cleveland and Washington, besides the Boston team. While a member of the White Sox he studied law and was admitted to the New York bar in 1939. Berg speaks seven languages, and his travels have carried him all over the world.

S. Paul Johnston, American magazine editor who, personally investigated Germany's airplane building activities with permission of her Air Ministry, will reveal what he saw and heard on "We, The People" over WABC Tuesday at 9 p. m.
