Lucille Manners will forsake her soprano repertoire to sing the contralto aria, "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice," from Saint-Saens' "Samson and Delilah" during the concert, Friday, at 8:00 p. m., over WEAJ. Miss Manners will be heard in De Leva's "La Serenata," "Tomorrow Night" by Grosz, and, with Ross Graham, baritone, "Down By the Old Mill Stream" by Taylor. Three selections by the ensemble include Arlen's "Down With Love" from "Hurray For What," the Richard Rodgers hit, "Falling in Love With Love" and Victor Herbert's "Romany Life."

A. N. "Bo" McMillan, head football coach of Indiana university, will appear as Grantland Rice's guest. They will discuss the probable result of the Fordham-Indiana clash the following day among other things pertinent to the gridiron.

Louise Massey will sing "Lonely Rose at My Cabin Door" as her solo during the Plantation Party, Friday, at 9:00 p. m., over WJZ, and also will be heard with the Westerners in "Camptown Races." Dick Powell, singing star of the screen, will drop in for an informal chat with George Jessel during the comedian's Variety Program, Friday, at 9:30 p. m., over WEAJ. Other prominent guests will be featured with Peter Van Steeden's orchestra and the Merry Maes, swing singing quartet.

The familiar greeting "What's New" will be tenor Frank Munn's feature solo during Waltz Time, Friday, at 9:00 p. m., over WEAJ. Munn also will be heard with the chorus in "Who Told You I Cared."
