

Today's Radio Highlights

The Young People's Concert by the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, Rudolph Ganz conducting, stresses the minuet and scherzo in today's lesson. Illustrations from the works of Rameau, Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven and Mendelssohn will be played—WJSV, 11:05 a. m.

The traditional ceremonies convening the joint session of the Virginia General Assembly will be broadcast from historic Williamsburg's House of Burgesses. Honored guests are the Right Hon. Marquess of Lothian, British Ambassador to the United States, and Gov. James Price of Virginia—WOL, 11:30 p. m.

Wagner's stirring "Die Walkure" is the presentation of the Metropolitan Opera Company. In the leading roles are Kirsten Flagstad, as Brunnhilde; Lauritz Melchior, as Siegmunde, and Marjorie Lawrence as Sieglinde. Mme. Flagstad and Mr. Melchior, who appeared in a joint concert here last month, have just completed the first recording of their voices together. Erich Leinsdorf conducts the orchestra and Milton Cross narrates—WMAL, 1:40 p. m.

Your Hit Parade, one of radio's most consistently popular programs, presents the ten top tunes of the week through the able orchestrations of Mark Warnow and Orrin Tucker—WJSV, 9 p. m.

Washington's only Barn Dance, aired from Alexandria, with an all-local cast—WOL, 9:15 p. m.

Conductor Bruno Walter yields his baton for the piano in the N. B. C. Symphony Orchestra Concert. The famed musician, as well known at the keyboard as he is on the podium, will play Handel's Concerto Grosso in G Minor. The remainder of the program is devoted to Mozart's "Haffner" Symphony in D Major and the Symphony No. 2 in D Major, by Brahms—WMAL, 10 p. m.

Bob Crosby and his Bob Cats swing out the latest melodies and some old ones, too, in new arrangements, on the Caravan program. Mildred Bailey is the vocalist—WRC, 10 p. m.

The Gay Nineties Revue provides an unusual bit of entertainment, with a revue that harks back to the Nineties but is keyed to the tempo of the Forties. Beatrice Kaye, the music hall comedienne, is alone worth tuning in for—WJSV, 10:30 p. m.
