

"Who's Yehoodi" Broadcast Will Be Repeated By Kyser

Glorified Version Of Popular Program Set
Wednesday Night; Hospital Drama Is
Scheduled For Airing

In response to popular demand, the entire cast of Kay Kyser's College of Musical Knowledge will repeat its glorified version of "Who's Yehoodi" during the broadcast over WEAJ Wednesday at 9 p. m.

Other musical features will include Ginny Simms singing "All This and Heaven Too" and "Fools Rush In," Harry Babbitt vocalizing "Sierra Sue" and "I'm Nobody's Baby New," a duet offering of "The Breeze and I" by Miss Simms and Babbitt; "Mr. Meadowlark," sung by Sully Mason, and orchestral renditions of "Playmates," "El Rancho Grande," "Beer Barrel Polka" and "What's the Reason."

Radio stage and screen star Betty Garde will co-star with Myron McCormick in a behind-the-scenes hospital drama for the fifth "Manhattan At Midnight" program over WJZ Wednesday at 7:30 p. m.

Featured in an original story by Frank Nolan, Miss Garde and McCormick will be heard as a nurse and a doctor who risk their lives and cast their love aside to save the nurse's wayward brother from a murder charge.

McCormick scored as the interne in Pare Lorentz's sensational film, "Fight for Life," while Betty currently is starring in the radio serial, "My Son and I," and recently completed the lead on Broadway in "Primrose Path."
