

# Meredith Willson Day To Be Observed During Revue

## San Francisco Visit Will Be Homecoming For Maestro And Several Members Of Musical Cast

"Meredith Willson Day" will be observed on Treasure Island Tuesday, when the NBC maestro takes his musical revue to San Francisco for the broadcast over WLW at 8:30 p. m. The visit to the Bay city will be in the nature of a homecoming for Willson and members of his cast. Besides the conductor himself, comedian Cliff Nazarro, producer Cecil Underwood and soloists Kay St. Germain and Ray Hendricks all have lived in San Francisco at various times.

The performance of Willson's second symphony, "Missions of California", with the composer conducting and with O-scar Levant as soloist, to be given at the San Francisco Opera House the night of Aug. 27, is the occasion necessitating the broadcast of Meredith Willson's Musical Revue from NBC's San Francisco studios earlier the same evening.

Four true dramatic stories will be enacted on the Court of Missing Heirs program Tuesday, 7:00 p. m. over WJR in an effort to find the missing claimants to more than \$33,000. One of the musical highlights of the Treasure Chest program, Tuesday, 7:30 p. m. over WLW will be a duet sung by Jean Farney and Henry Russell, titled "Little Girl." Donna and her Don Juans will sing "Crosstown." "All This, and Heaven Too" and an unusual vocal arrangement of "One Look At You." Horace Heidt leads the Musical Knights in "Acapulco" by Madame Grever, and the acting versatility of the bandmen will be focussed on the novelty tune, "We Saw The Sea."

A fair foursome of television queens from the RCA television exhibit at the World's Fair will oppose a quartet of New York newspapermen covering the Fair during the Battle of Sexes program Tuesday at 8:00 p. m. WLW.

The girls, each a "Miss Television", are Pat Murray, a University of Pennsylvania student who became a John Powers' model; Lorraine Dunn, also a model, from Chicago; Patricia Fitzgerald, of

Philadelphia, and Starr Martin, from Winston-Salem, N. C.

The men's team is composed of Irving Spiegle, of the New York Times; Walter Airm, of the New York Herald Tribune; Henry Beckott of the New York Post, and Gene Halmus, of Standard News Service.
