9:35, WMAL—The Budapest String Quartet plays Beethoven's Quartet in C minor, Op. 18, No. 2, under the auspices of the Whittall Foundation at the Library of Congress.

10:15, WJSV—Earl Browder, Communist candidate for the Presidency, addresses the Nation on a coast-to-coast hook-up.

10:45, WOL—Dr. Frederick Stock conducts a special airing during the Golden Jubilee of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra: Third Symphony, Beethoven; Rondo, "Till Eulenspiegel," Richard Strauss and Capriccio Espagnol," Rimsky-Korsakov.

11:15, WOL—Chief of the Division of Public Contracts of the Department of Labor L. Metcalfe Walling talks on "Speeding up National Defense."

11:30, WMAL—Yom Kippur is observed by Rabbi Edward L. Israel, Temple Har Sinai, Baltimore, and Mrs. Leon Watters, chairman of the Conference Committee of National Jewish Women's Organizations. Cantor David Putterman, of the Park Avenue Synagogue, and his choir sing the "Kol Nidre."
