Wallace, Rayburn Talks, Dane Programs Mark 'I Am American' Day

The first "I Am an American Day" today will bring to radio its highlight attractions.

The second annual Dane County Citizenship day exercises will be presented from the University of Wisconsin stock pavilion through WIBA starting at 2 p. m. The program will be divided into two parts, the first being the addresses of welcome a short discussion of the purposes of the day. At 3 p. m., WIBA will air the second portion closing with the address by Justice Chester Fowler of the Wisconsin supreme court who will administer the oath of citizenship.
