Time Changes Are Listed For Two Popular Programs

**"City Desk" And "The Spotlight" Will Be Moved
From Thursday Evening Spots To
Saturday Evenings**

Time changes on two of radio's most popular night shows take place this week over the WABC network, when both "City Desk" and "The Spotlight" are moved from their Thursday evening spots to similar permanent positions on Saturday night.

Beginning Saturday and every Saturday thereafter, "City Desk," the stirring drama of newspaper life starring Gertrude Warner and Donald Briggs, will be broadcast at 7:30 p. m. over WABC.

At 7 p. m. and immediately preceding "City Desk," the popular "Colgate Spotlight" will be heard over the same network with genial Ed East launching another group of talented young artists on the road to fame and fortune.

Each week's "Spotlight" brings before the American radio audience five ambitious acts, each of which receives a standard fee of \$50, with the one voted the best

winning an additional prize of \$200. Still another \$200 prize goes to the winner of the gala all-winner broadcast every five weeks.

Ted Steele, novachord virtuoso and one of radio's busiest band-leaders and master-of-ceremonies, will inaugurate a new feature program entitled "Boy Meets Band," Saturday, from 7 to 7:30 p. m. over WJZ.

The new feature will dramatize the start of a fictional jazz band and in weekly installments will tell how the band developed its style, the trials and tribulations of its leader, and will reveal the general home life of its members.

A phenomenon in the world of modern music, Lorin Maazel, 11, will conduct two Saturday night concerts on the NBC Summer Symphony orchestra, July 5 and 12, over WJZ.

The infant prodigy conductor was born in Neuilly, France, on March 6, 1930, of American parents, and showed amazing gifts at a very early age, astounding his parents by reading virtually at sight the orchestral score of an Andante from a Haydn Symphony.

Dr. Frank Black, musical director of the National Broadcasting Company, will conduct the first number of the July 5 concert, starting at 8:30 p. m., the Overture to "A Midsummer Night's Dream" by Mendelssohn, and then present Maazel to the radio and studio audiences. The youngster will then take over the baton, leading the orchestra in the "Italian" Symphony by Mendelssohn, the "Cradle Song" by Dika Newlin, and the Overture to "Rienzi" by Wagner.

The Fourth will be celebrated by the "National Barn Dance" troupe in the old hayloft, Saturday at 8 p. m., over WEF with a program made up of songs of America, both old and new. Grace Wilson, popular singer, and Andy Andrews, comic, will be guests.
