RECORD WHEAT HARVEST SEEN IN HARDIN-CO

KENTON, July 11—A bumper wheat crop is anticipated in Hardin-co this summer as wheat, now being harvested, begins to pour into local grain elevators.

Allen Martin who yesterday combined 15 acres of wheat on the Martin farm southwest of here, reported 50 bushels to the acre for the first time since before 1917. The harvest brought 758 bushels and 10 pounds of wheat which made 50 bushels and 32 pounds to the acre.

Also reported was 39 bushels to the acre, raised on 21 acres on the F. J. Laubis farm in Dudleytp; 37 bushels to the acre on the Arthur Harrison farm in Dudleytp, and 35 bushels to the acre on the Dan Holiman farm in Goshen-tp where 910 bushels were raised on 26 acres.
