Famous Tennis Star Will Exchange Volleys With Comedian; June Havoc Set For Appearance With Bing Crosby

"Big Bill" Tilden, of tennis fame, several times Davis Cup winner and one of America's top net racqueteers, will exchange volleys with "Honest" Frank Morgan, America's comedy racketeer, on Thursday at 8 p. m. over WEAf.
