Girl Scout Day Camps To Open Here Monday

Monday marks the opening of the local Girl Scout Day camps which will give all girls in the city between the ages of 7 and 15 an opportunity to get a taste of camp life which they might otherwise be unable to acquire.

With the opening of a day camp at Schoonover park for the first time this year, the total number of camps that will be in operation until July 28 has been brought to three. For several years a Girl Scout day camp has been in operation at Faurot City Park, and last year a new camp was opened in Lincoln Park. All three of these locations will be ready for occupants Monday.

The new camp at Schoonover Park will be under the direction of Mrs. William Neumeier. Mrs. Paul Sowards will have charge of the Faurot camp, and Mrs. G. L. Crist will direct the Lincoln Park camp.

In announcing the final camp plans, Mrs. Paul Sowards, general day camp chairman, emphasized that these camps are open to all girls from 7 to 15 whether they belong to the scouts or not. Registration blanks, which must be filled out and turned back to the camp director, may be obtained at the Girl Scout office, Citizen's bldg, or at the camp sites.

Each camp will operate four days a week, Monday thru Thursday, with daily sessions beginning at 9:30 a. m. and closing at 4 p. m.
