Rent Revision Plan Announced

Some Landlords Can Apply to OPA

Landlords who can prove they are receiving a substantially decreased net income from living quarters due to increases in property taxes or operating costs may be permitted by OPA to increase rents, but such rises will not imperil the overall rent stabilization picture, Merrill J. Haley, acting area rent director, said today, in response to queries from Madison landlords and others on the eve of the date, Sept. 1, when petitions for rent increases will be received by the local OPA rent control office located at 304 N. Park st.
