FSA to Make Loans to Veterans

JEFFERSON—The Farm Security Administration (FSA) will offer aid to returning war veterans who wish to establish themselves on farms, C. H. Nelson, FSA supervisor, Jefferson, announced today in asking such veterans to get information from him. Loans up to \$2,500 can be made for livestock, machinery, building repairs, cash rent, feed and seed, and other things necessary for the operation of a farm, Nelson said. Veterans are eligible who have a farm background either as owner, tenant, or laborer, and can make satisfactory tenure arrangement for a family-size farm.
