MOTORIST GIVES FIRST CLUES IN SLAYING CASE

JACKSON, Mich., Jan. 13 — (INS) — A motorist who passed by the car of Senator Warren G. Hooper shortly after he was killed provided the first real break today in the investigation of the crime.

Special Grand Jury Prosecutor Kim Sigler said the motorist saw Hooper's car blocked off to the side of the road by a maroon sedan. One man remained in the sedan and another stood by an open door in Hooper's car, standing over a prostrate form slumped on the seat.

Sigler said the witness told him the sedan was parked crosswise in front of Hooper's car indicating that the senator's automobile was forced off the road.

The witness, Sigler said, is positive he could identify the driver of the sedan.
