

# World Trade And Peace To Be Subject Of Program

Assistant Secretaries of State William L. Clayton and Dean G. Acheson will discuss "World Trade and World Peace" on the next "Our Foreign Policy" program, at 6 p. m. Lima time Saturday over WEA.F. Assistant Secretary Archibald MacLeish, in charge of Public and Cultural Relations, will continue to act as chairman, conducting the state department series.

As an authority on trade, Clayton, in charge of economic affairs in the state department, formerly was assistant Secretary of Commerce.
