The spade K lead was won in dummy. Seeing at a glance that the dummy's clubs could be cut to one by means of a discard on hearts, he promptly ran three rounds of trumps on a "safety plny," raked in four hearts for a discard of the club A and then realized all of a sudden that he had left only one trump in dummy to ruff two clubs. All of which was impossible, so he lost a club trick and was set.
