

HIGH POINTS: The whole air

of rather aimless foolishness . . . Crosby's effortless comedy . . . handsome Technicolor charming, wholly irrelevant miniature ballet tucked unexpectedly in the middle of the picture . . the superb, soaring beau Canada's Jasper national beauty park, Canada's Jasper national park, photographed to pinch-hit for the Tyrol (the presence in the park of an internationally famous golf course and in the case of Crosby presumably is wholly coincidental... but Bing won the course championship last summer a few weeks after the picture was finished

LOW POINTS: Thin plot . tasteless situations . . . unusually trite musical background . . . Miss Fontaine taking the whole ing with grim seriousness.
