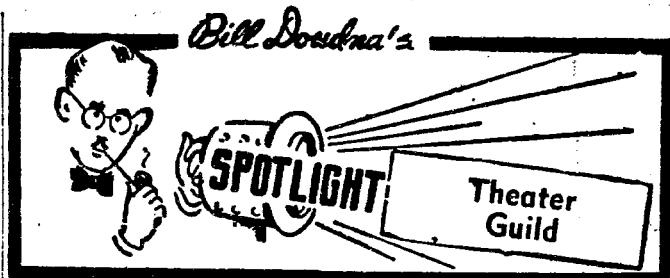

Story: Lily Stevens, Chicago entertainer, blows into a small town near the Canadian border as one of Jeffy's latest ideas in the "entertainer" line for his road house. Pete, business manager, tries to deport Lily immediately. She resists, becomes the new blues-singing sensation and Jeffy's girl to the town's way of thinking. Lily thinks differently, breaks through Pete's icy reserve while Jeffy is on a hunting trip. They plan to marry. The spoiled, egotistical Jeffy tells Pete to get out, then has him arrested for stealing, and from there on in the picture is a "fight to the finish" with aid from Susie, the cashier who carried a torch for Pete.

High Points: Widmark's usual sadistic and appealing portrayal of an egotistical maniac... Lupino's flippant air and her "best singing without a voice"... a slightly chubby Celeste Holm as the small-town girl friend... the blood and thunder fights.

Low Points: The slow build-up to the inevitable boy-gets-best-friend's-girl routine.

Verdict: Pretty good, and pretty unusual in spots for the theme.
