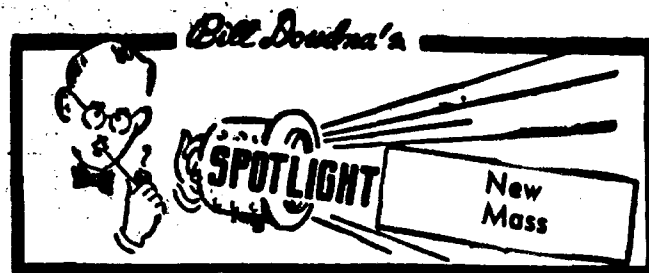

A new mass composed by the first man to receive a doctorate in music from the University of Wisconsin will be performed June 6 at West DePere.

The composer is the Rev. Robert A. Sromovsky, former assistant pastor of Holy Redeemer parish.

Fr. Sromovsky now is head of the music department at St. Norbert college. He dedicated the mass to the Rt. Rev. Abbot B. H. Pennings, founder and president of the college, and members of the faculty.

The "Missa Aurea" or "Golden Mass" will be sung by the St. Norbert abbey choir at a pontifical mass in St. Joseph church on the campus, as part of extensive ceremonies commemorating the founding of Norbertine education in the United States.

Fr. Sromovsky received a degree of doctor of philosophy in music at Wisconsin in 1936. He had received his bachelor of arts degree at St. Norbert, a degree in sacred music from the Pontifical institute in Rome, and a master of arts degree in mathematics at the University of Wisconsin.

Fr. Sromovsky conducts the abbey choir and supervises several church choirs in Green Bay. He is a native of Manistique, Mich.
